

Rights of other members to attend Committee or Sub-Committee

1. Any member of the Council shall be entitled to attend any meeting of a Committee or Sub-Committee to which he has not been appointed, subject to (2) and (5) below.
2. Any member shall be allowed to address a Committee or Sub-Committee of which he is not a member (but not to vote) on any matter on an agenda other than one in which he has a prejudicial interest.
3. A member of the Council who has moved a motion which has been referred to any Committee or Sub-Committee by the Council shall have notice of the meeting of the Committee at which it is proposed to consider the motion.
4. A member of the Council shall have the right to attend any public meeting arranged by an officer or any meeting of a Committee or Sub-Committee called to make any inspection of any site or works within his electoral ward or which is to consider the making of any Compulsory Purchase Order of land or buildings within such ward. He shall have notice of any such meeting and if he attends shall have the right to give his views.

 - (a) Any member of the council who attends any meeting of a Committee or Sub-Committee shall be entitled to remain at any such meeting notwithstanding the exclusion of the public and the press and regardless of the item under consideration provided that he does not have a prejudicial interest.
 - (b) This right shall not apply to meetings of Standards Committee, General Purposes Committee, Appeals Committee, Licensing Committee or to Staffing Panel when the Committee is considering its decision in the absence of the parties to the matter.
6. No co-opted member (or their named substitute) of any committee or sub-committee of the Council shall be entitled to attend or speak at meetings of the Council or any of its committees or sub-committees in respect of any matter of exempt or confidential business unless the Council (or as the case may be, a committee or sub-committee) resolves that they may be present for that part of the meeting.
