TACKLING"THE BLIGHT OF FLY-TIPPING THE CLA'S FIVE POINT PLAN

Rural Britain is facing a surge in fly-tipping. Almost two thirds of farmers and landowners are affected each year, with some targeted multiple times each month. This results in a vicious cycle of costly clean-ups by the victims who bear the burden of waste crime.

We need to take action to tackle this blight on our beautiful countryside, a crime which causes financial damage to victims. The CLA has set out a five-point action plan for how government, farmers, landowners and rural communities can work together to fight back.

Impose and enforce penalties which better reflect the seriousness of the crime – seizure of vehicles must be the default penalty to send a clear signal that criminals will face damaging consequences if they are caught fly-tipping

Enforce fines for home and business owners whose waste is found in fly-tipped locations to act as a deterrent and encourage waste disposal through legal channels.

Appoint a national 'Fly-Tipping Tsar' whose responsibilities would include:

- a. Co-ordinating with national agencies in tackling serious organised criminal gangs.
- **b.** Monitoring and reporting on the scale of the problem across public AND private land.
- **c.** Benchmarking enforcement performance across all relevant agencies.

4. Develop new ways to clear up and support victims

- **a.** Introduce a new scheme to allow any private landowner who did not cause or knowingly permit the fly-tipping to dispose of it at a waste disposal site free of charge.
- **b.** Remove landowner liability to clear up waste on private land.

5. Promote education and working in partnership

- **a.** Share best practice advice to landowners on how to reduce the chance of being a victim of fly-tipping, based on Design Out Crime principles.
- **b.** Showcase excellent examples of local partnerships including shared CCTV monitoring schemes, Countryside Watch and post-incident intelligence sharing.
